Important Reminder

We receive many queries asking whether a GP is obliged to enter details of the patient's family history on a PMA?

If a GP has information about a member of the patient's family and that family member is identifiable, then the GP should have the consent of that person in order to include their medical information on the PMA.

It is recommended therefore to leave it to the patient themselves to offer their family history to the insurance company, if requested. When completing the PMA, the GP should cross out the section entitled "Family History" and clearly mark it "Third Party Information- Patient to Supply Information"; the patient will then provide information relating to "Family History" when completing their section of the form.

By adopting the above approach, the GP is not releasing any third party information to the insurance company nor are they confirming that there is or is not relevant family history to disclose; they are putting that responsibility on the patient. The GP should inform the patient of the need to disclose all relevant information to the insurance company and to act in utmost good faith.

"Just do this one thing today"

A bite sized risk reduction exercise for the busy GP:-

Monitoring Potentially Toxic Long Term Medications

Consider performing an audit of patients on a potentially toxic medication:-

- Are your patients up to date with their bloods or other monitoring?
- Have they been warned about possible significant side effects?
- Would a patient information leaflet be of assistance?

Medications which frequently cause problems can include:-

- Lithium (Lithium Toxicity remember the augmenting effect of NSAIDS and Diuretics)
- Methotrexate (neutropenia)
- **Plaquenil** (maculopathy ensure patient has a routine eye examination)
- Nitrofurantoin (pulmonary fibrosis, interstitial pneumonitis – beware the patient with chronic cough)

Members please take note that this is not an exhaustive list of potentially toxic medications!
